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The mummies of the Canary Islands belong to the (1)----- Guanche people and date to the time before 14th-century Spanish explorers settled in the area. The revolutions of 1848, also known as the springtime of the peoples, were a series of revolutions throughout Europe that (1)----- almost two years, between January 1848 and October 1849. They (2)----- the most widespread revolutionary wave in European history to date. The revolutions varied widely in their aims (3)----- generally opposed conservative systems, such as absolute monarchy and feudalism, and sought to establish nation states, founded on constitutionalism and popular sovereignty. The revolutionary wave began with the revolution in Sicily in January and spread across Europe after the revolution in France in February 1848. Over fifty countries were affected, but with no significant coordination or cooperation among their respective revolutionaries. Some of the major political contributing factors were widespread dissatisfaction (4)----- political leadership, demands for more participation in government and democracy, for freedom of the press, and by the working class for economic rights, and the rise of nationalism. Other economic factors, (5)----- the European potato failure, triggered mass starvation, migration, and civil unrest.

The Wright brothers gained the mechanical skills essential to their success by working for years in their Dayton, Ohio-based shop with printing presses, bicycles, motors, and other machinery. Their work with bicycles, in particular, influenced their belief (1)----- an unstable vehicle such as a flying machine (2)----- and balanced with practice. This was a trend, (3)----- many other aviation pioneers were also dedicated cyclists and involved in the bicycle business in various ways. From 1900 until their first powered flights in late 1903, the brothers conducted (4)----- glider tests that also developed their skills as pilots. (1)----- the exuberant and theatrical Baroque architecture found in Catholic regions such as Italy and Spain, the Dutch variant favored sobriety, balance, and clarity. Rather than dramatic curves and lavish ornamentation, Dutch Baroque architecture is characterized by symmetry, classical proportions, and a controlled use of decorative elements. Civic buildings, town halls, and private residences exemplify this style, with the Royal Palace of Amsterdam standing as one of its most (2)----- monuments. Migration is the regular seasonal movement, often north and south, (1)----- by many species of birds. Migration is marked (2)----- its annual seasonality and movement between breeding and non-breeding areas. Nonmigratory bird movements include those made (3)----- environmental changes including in food availability, habitat, or weather. Sometimes, journeys are not termed "true migration" (4)----- they are irregular or in only one direction. Non-migratory birds are said to be resident or sedentary. Approximately 1,800 of the world's 10,000 bird species are long-distance migrants. Many bird populations migrate long distances along a flyway. The most common pattern involves flying north in the spring to breed in the temperate or Arctic summer and returning in the autumn to wintering grounds in warmer regions to the south. As a discipline, psychology has long sought to (1)----- accusations that it is a "soft" science. Philosopher of science Thomas Kuhn's 1962 critique implied that psychology, overall, was in a pre-paradigm state, lacking agreement (2)----- the type of overarching theory found in mature hard sciences such as chemistry and physics. (3)----- some areas of psychology rely on research methods such as self-reports in surveys and questionnaires, critics asserted that psychology is not an objective science. Existential psychology emphasizes the need to understand a client's total orientation (1)----- the world. Existential psychology is opposed to reductionism, behaviorism, and other methods that objectify the individual. In the 1950s and 1960s, influenced by philosophers Søren Kierkegaard and Martin Heidegger, psychoanalytically trained American psychologist Rollo May (2)----- to develop existential psychology. Existential psychotherapy, which follows from existential psychology, is a therapeutic approach that is (3)----- the idea that a person's inner conflict arises from that individual's confrontation with the givens of existence. Existential psychologists tend to differ from more "humanistic" psychologists in the former's relatively neutral view of human nature and relatively positive assessment of anxiety. Existential psychologists emphasized the humanistic themes of death, free will, and meaning, (4)----- that myths and narratives can shape meaning; meaning can be deepened by the acceptance of free will, which is requisite to living an authentic life, (5)----- often with death anxiety.

The breakdown of ozone in the stratosphere (1)----- reduced absorption of ultraviolet radiation. (2)-----, unabsorbed and dangerous ultraviolet radiation reaches the Earth's surface at a higher intensity. Ozone levels (3)----- by a worldwide average of about 4 percent since the late 1970s. For approximately 5 percent of the Earth's surface, around the north and south poles, much larger seasonal declines have been seen, and are described as "ozone holes". The internet provides people (1)----- limited accountability and often with no filter. Bullying can feel easier and less restrictive through the use of the internet. This phenomenon is described and detailed in a principle, called "the online disinhibition effect". The use of technology for purposes of bullying can be detrimental to someone's online reputation. The information published online will often remain there indefinitely, (2)----- it is taken down or removed by the person who published it, or by moderators of the website or web platform, or by other users. Future employers and other people with access to the internet (3)----- able to see others' digital footprint and how individuals behaved or treated other people - especially if concerted efforts are allocated in order to search for and find any posts, webpages, or content that may negatively impact the target person's evaluation or eligibility for a position.
